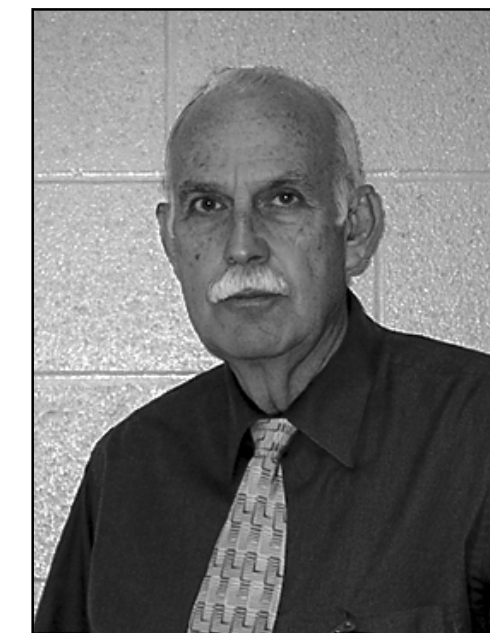
BHS welcomes its new teachers

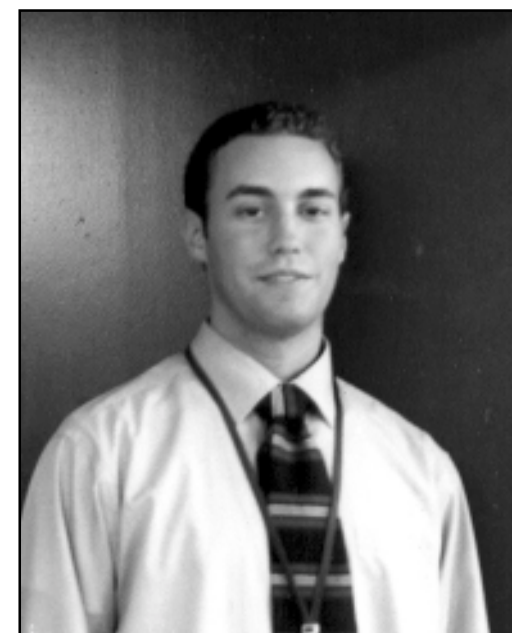
Charles Brewster
